

Karol Wojtyła, Pope John Paul II, was head of the Catholic Church and sovereign of the Vatican City State from 1978 to 2005. He was elected pope by the second papal conclave of 1978, which was called after Pope John Paul I, who had been elected in August to succeed Pope Paul VI, died after 33 days. Cardinal Wojtyła was elected on the third day of the conclave and adopted the name of his predecessor in tribute to him. John Paul II is recognized as helping to end Communist rule in his native Poland and eventually all of Europe.<sup>[9]</sup> John Paul II significantly improved the Catholic Church's relations with Judaism, Islam, and the Eastern Orthodox Church. John Paul II was the second longest-serving pope in modern history after Pope Pius IX.

#### Excerpt

We Christians can't seem to get suffering right. We don't want to talk about it, perhaps because we know how much can go wrong. If we start a conversation about suffering, some people won't stop. We can even get a competition going about whose suffering should take top prize.

Even though we don't want to talk about suffering, and we can veer off track too easily, we nevertheless need to because we have so many problems with it.

The early church, out of which First Peter arose, knew things about suffering most of us can't imagine. I hope we never have to learn what they knew. Even if the kind of suffering First Peter talks about arose out of a situation of persecution from Rome, what it teaches us about suffering can help with the kinds of suffering we face as well. If we typically misunderstand suffering, maybe the insights of First Peter can help us make progress toward getting it right. We might explore some of the ways that our thinking can be unhelpful, and even unfaithful

#### **Meaning of Life**

The writer Robert Fulghum tells of how he once traveled to Greece to attend a seminar. On the last day of the conference, their teacher asked if there were any questions. Fulghum, a jokester, laughingly asked the seminar leader what the meaning of life was. Everyone laughed and got ready to leave. But then the leader responded, "I will answer your question."

Then, taking his wallet out of his pocket, he removed from it a small, round mirror about the size of a quarter. He explained:

When I was a small child during World War II ... one day on the road, I found the broken pieces of a mirror. A German motorcycle had been wrecked in that place. I tried to find all the pieces and put them together, but it was not possible, so I kept the largest piece. This one. And by scratching it on a stone, I made it round. I began to play with it as a toy and became fascinated by the fact that I could reflect light into dark places where the sun could never shine. It became a game for me to get light into the most inaccessible places that I could find. I kept the little mirror, and as I grew up, I would take it out at idle moments and continue the challenge of the game.

As I became a man, I grew to understand that this was not just a child's game, but a metaphor of what I could do with my life. I came to understand that I am not the light or the source of the light. But light — be it truth or understanding or knowledge — is there, and it will only shine in many dark places if I reflect it. I am a fragment of a mirror whose whole design and shape I do not know. Nevertheless, with what I have, I can reflect light into the dark places of this world — into the dark places of human hearts — and change some things in some people. Perhaps others seeing it happen will do likewise. This is what I am about. This is the meaning of my

The peace of the Risen Lord be with you and your loved ones.

Many of you know by now that I had to cancel the annual Memorial Day Mass held at the cemetery due to the Coronavirus Pandemic and the current physical distancing guidelines now in place. I will make every attempt to reschedule the Memorial Day mass at the earliest possible date. Notification of the Memorial Day Mass will be posted in the weekly bulletin and on the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton website.

You may have also noticed that mowing and other necessary maintenance at the cemetery have been delayed. The reasons for the delay include the weather and the fact that we had to lay off the part-time cemetery employees. The staff layoffs are the direct result of the lack of a steady weekly collection. As of May 18, 2020, however, the part-time staff was rehired and mowing and other maintenance projects will begin in earnest. Please know that we are doing everything that we can during this critical time in our church.

St. Mary's Cemetery has been a trusted place for burials since 1851.
